President Peckinpaugh informed Council that they new state guidelines for shutting down
a road that connects to a state road is now required to have 4ft Barricades in order to
close connecting roads. President Peckinpaugh stated that Street Superintendent Walker
had asked that Council take the money out of Loit to purchase thirty barricades at a cost
of three hundred and ninety dollars each. President Peckinpaugh moved to approve.

- Chief Schofield presented Council with the Police Departments Annual Report. Chief Schofield stated 2020 was a Hell of a Year. Law Enforcement as a whole had taken a hit all over the country but the Citizens of New Castle stood behind our Officers. With seven Officers out with Covid and others that were quarantined, plus injuries and two Officers trying to get through the academy, more overtime was needed to cover the shifts. Three new Officers were hired to replace Retiring Officers or Officers that resigned. Chief Schofield stated they were still moving forward in getting the new Police Department completed next to the water office. More gun arrests were made in 2020 than in other years, but burglaries, theft and shoplifting were down. Chief Schofield said moving forward in 2021 the departments objectives would be; hiring another Officer, getting Officers to become more proactive, continuing renovation of the new Police Department, and increased training for the Officers. Chief Schofield stated that just in the first two months we are in the process of purchasing a Bearcat armored vehicle and license plate readers will be installed soon. Chief Schofield thanked everyone for working with the department in fulfilling their needs.
- Councilman Perdue inquired about the number of crimes being down and was it due to Covid. Chief Schofield stated that for two months they only served warrants on violent crimes because of an outbreak of Covid at the jail.
- Councilman Dicken asked if the expense in archiving body camera footage had went down. Chief Schofield stated that storing the data was still very expensive.
- Councilman Walden thanked all the Emergency Services working for all of their help in these unforeseen times.
- President Peckinpaugh thanked Chief Schofield for presenting the report and that he always looked forward to hearing it and stated the level of professionalism in our

Emergency Services was next to none.

- On a final note, Chief Schofield stated that if anyone had any questions that would like to have answered, even a community member, please don't hesitate to contact Assistant Chief Wardlow or himself.
- President Peckinpaugh informed Council that INDOT is requiring new barricades to be
 placed on roads that intersect with a state road when closing them down. President
 Peckinpaugh moved to accept the quote from ISB for 30 barricades at \$290.00 Each for a
 total of \$8,700.00. from the Loit fund. Vice President Hancock seconded. Motion
 carried 7-0.

- After the Vote Melvin Campbell, mechanic for the Street Department, addressed the council, thanking everyone involved on their new facility and it is working out great, Mr. Campbell also stated that taking the trash to Muncie has saved a lot of maintenance on the vehicles.
- Brian Slavey, Street Department employee, addressed Council, stating that he would like to continue to take the trash to the Muncie site. Mr. Slavey informed Council that it was much cleaner, easier access in and out and you did not have to drive on any mud or trash to dump your load.
- Jeremy Brown, Street Department Employee, addressed Council, stating that he also would like to keep taking trash to the Muncie facilities for all of the reasons that were previously stated.
- Superintendent Walker advised Council that two months into last year we had already spent two thousand dollars on repairs and tires for the trash truck. This year he has only spent forty dollars.
- Councilman Walden thanked the Street Department for coming and expressing their concerns. Councilman Walden stated that this is who Council needs to hear from the people actually out there doing they daily operations.
- Mayor York read a thank you letter sent on behalf of the Street Department from a City Resident Omar Auxier;

- Council Guffey also stated that he had seen old tires laying around at 21st and C, 22nd and I and 2520 Walnut. Mayor York stated he would get them picked up and take them to Henry County Solid Waste Management drop off site.
